Our friends who have supported Katie's House since inception will recall that our original mission was to establish and manage an assisted living facility for young adult women with developmental disabilities. The home opened in 2007 and it was a learning experience. The administrative demands, of managing such a home, were daunting but we persevered. Since then, we modified our objectives and decided to assist other parents and guardians to set up homes similar to KH. We hope to fulfill our mission by establishing a series of mutually supportive but individually managed homes for adults with disabilities.

In 2008 it was time for Katie's House to re-invent itself, moving from principally a provider of housing to becoming a provider of programs aimed at enriching the lives of young adults with disabilities in the surrounding community. Thus our Center for Advancement was formed, with all of its associated programs.

We continued to meet with families to provide information on funding for adults with disabilities and continue to co -chair meetings for the Division of Developmental Disabilities. We believe parents learned a lot over the past year. Some went away encouraged and some were still overwhelmed. Those parents that were encouraged by what they learned will go on to the next step. In that regard, please read about Richard below. Katie's House will provide information and resources to help Richard's parents set up their own supportive housing, under the auspices of Katie's House. I'm sure that you will hear more about this effort in future newsletters.



Meet Richard: Richard is 24 and autistic. He is a friendly young man who works part time at a local supermarket stocking shelves. A few months ago Richard spent most of his free time watching TV because the parents could not find any meaningful activities for him, until they found Katie's House. Now he actively participates in KH programs, including sign, dance, cooking classes and The Friendship Group. Since joining these activities his mood and attitude improved greatly. Communications and social skills are the two areas that he needed to work on and this also improved. Donations to KH, helps to support the programs that gave Richard's life, a new dimension
